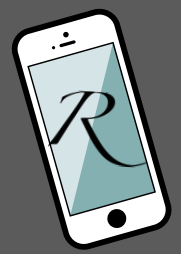

**COUNCIL CORNER: Council happenings for the month of June.**

- Budget & Planning**
  - Resolution No. R-3882: Approved the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan for FY2026–FY2030
  - Resolution No. R-3895: Approved the FY2026 Personnel and Supplemental Budget Requests to be considered in the budget preparation
- Public Safety & Infrastructure**
  - Ordinance No. 2025-15: Removed the "No Truck" designation on Bamore Road on a small section between I-69 and Klauke. Trucks are still prohibited on the rest of Bamore from Spur 529 to Klauke Road.
  - Resolution No. R-3885: Approved the purchase and installation of replacement natural gas generators at City Hall, the Police Department and Fire Station No. 2
  - Ordinance No. 2025-16: Denied - Fireworks remain illegal within Rosenberg City Limits

**Stay Safe in the Summer Heat: Tips to Beat the Heat and Stay Healthy**

As temperatures rise across #Rtown, it's important to take precautions to protect yourself and your loved ones from the dangers of extreme heat. Summer heat can pose serious health risks—especially for children, older adults, and people with preexisting conditions. Whether you're enjoying time outdoors, working under the sun, or simply trying to stay cool at home, a few smart choices can make all the difference.

**Know the Signs of Heat-Related Illness**

Heat exhaustion and heat stroke are two of the most common and dangerous conditions that can occur during high temperatures. Watch for symptoms like: Dizziness or lightheadedness, Nausea or vomiting, Heavy sweating or lack of sweating, Headache, Rapid heartbeat, Muscle cramps, Confusion or fainting. If you or someone else shows signs of heat stroke—such as confusion, hot and dry skin, or unconsciousness—call 911 immediately. This is a medical emergency.

**Stay Hydrated**

Drink plenty of water throughout the day, even if you don't feel thirsty. Avoid beverages that can dehydrate you, such as alcohol, sugary drinks, and caffeine. Keep a reusable water bottle with you and refill it often.

**Dress for the Weather**

Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing made of breathable fabrics like cotton or linen. A wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses can help protect your face and eyes from the sun, while sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher helps prevent sunburn and reduces the risk of skin cancer.

**Avoid Peak Heat Hours**

If possible, plan outdoor activities for early morning or later in the evening when the sun is lower and temperatures are cooler. Avoid strenuous activities between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., when the sun is at its strongest.

**Keep Cool Indoors**

Use fans, air conditioning, or cool showers to help regulate your body temperature. If your home is not air-conditioned, visit public places like libraries, malls, or community centers to cool off. Many communities also open designated "cooling centers" during heatwaves.

**Check on Neighbors and Pets**

Extreme heat can be especially dangerous for the elderly, young children, and pets. Check in on family, friends, and neighbors who may need help. Never leave children or animals in a parked car, even for a few minutes—the temperature inside a vehicle can rise to deadly levels in a very short time.

Heat safety is everyone's responsibility. By staying informed and taking proactive steps, you can enjoy a fun, safe summer while minimizing the risks of heat-related illness!



**#RTOWN FUN FACT - ROSENBERG'S ROOTS IN RAILROAD**

Rosenberg's history is deeply tied to the railroad. The City was established in the 1880s as a key shipping point for the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway and was named after Henry von Rosenberg, the railway's first president. Thanks to its strategic location along the rail line, Rosenberg quickly grew into a hub for commerce and travel in Fort Bend County. More than a century later, rail remains a vital part of Rosenberg's economy. The city continues to serve as a major freight corridor, helping goods move efficiently across Texas and beyond. From historic roots to modern movement, rail keeps Rosenberg on the map!

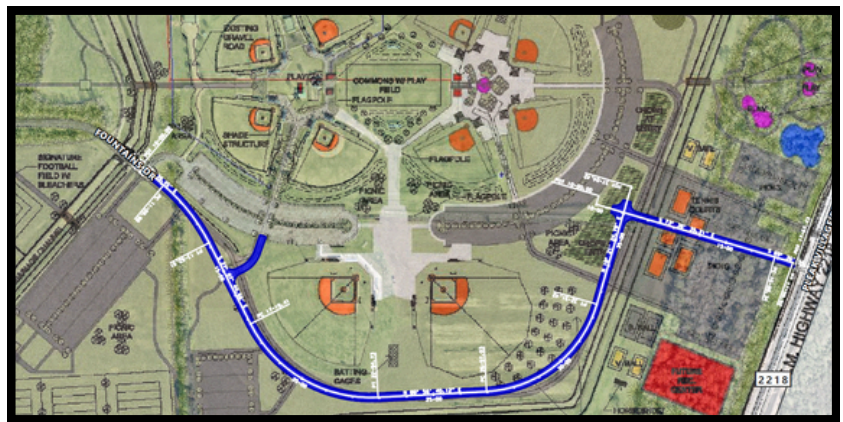

## Rosenberg Development Corporation Enhances Seabourne Creek Regional Sports Complex

The Rosenberg Development Corporation (RDC) is assisting the city of Rosenberg with funding for construction of a secondary access road to Seabourne Creek Regional Sports Complex. The Complex is currently only accessible from the U.S. 59 frontage road at Fountains Drive, but that will soon change! A new two-lane access road will be constructed to connect the parking lot to the newly widened FM 2218, just north of Koeblen Rd. The recent improvements on FM 2218 included the construction of a turn lane and center median opening to accommodate this driveway connection, which is intended to relieve traffic congestion in the parking lot and improve traffic flow and pedestrian safety during events.

Seabourne Creek Regional Sports Complex serves as a vital community hub, offering well-maintained facilities that enhance the quality of life for residents through recreational opportunities and community engagement. Parks like this one provide spaces for physical activity, social gatherings and family-friendly events, fostering a stronger sense of community. Additionally, the Complex attracts nearly 100,000 visitors annually, with the majority from the Richmond-Rosenberg area, contributing significantly to local economic development by drawing visitors who support nearby businesses, restaurants and services.

The RDC is pleased to assist with these improvements to the Seabourne Creek Regional Sports Complex, which includes programming for baseball, football and soccer. These enhancements ensure the Complex remains a premier destination for both residents and visitors, supporting Rosenberg’s commitment to vibrant community spaces and economic growth.
