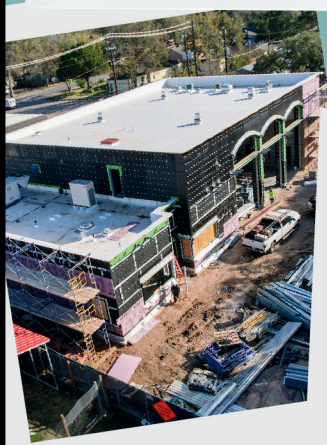

GRANTS

The City frequently pursues grant funding to bridge the gap between departmental resources and needs. Grants provide an opportunity to address identified challenges that may not be fully funded through the City's current budget. Additionally, securing a grant can accelerate project timelines, advancing initiatives that might otherwise take years to implement.

GRANTS AWARDED IN 2025 = \$3,817,102

- HMGP - Civic Center Generator | \$655,742
- HMGP - 8 Lift Station Generators | \$2,568,402

GRANT FUNDED EXPENDITURES IN 2025 = \$17,508,444

- Majority spent on Hazard Mitigation Grant Project (HMGP) - Drainage Mitigation Project with construction in progress on 3 of the 6 project phases

PLANNING AND PERMITTING

- Completed annexation of 157 acres into the City limits
- Issued 969 new addresses through the GIS Division
- Approved 39 final plats including 18 commercial plats and 21 residential plats
- Launched the new MGO Connect Software

PUBLIC SAFETY

- Achieved a 90% Live Release Rate at the Animal Shelter
- Began Construction on the new Emergency Services Complex and Fire Station 1
- Expanded the Bike Team and Honor Guard

PUBLIC SERVICES AND UTILITIES

- Installed energy-efficient LED Lighting at Seabourne Creek Sports Complex and Sunset Park
- Installed new roofs at Travis Park for pavilions 1 and 2
- Refurbished the Gazebo at City Hall
- Replaced 25% of legacy water meters under the water meter replacement program
- Moved Lift Station and Water Plant operations in-house saving millions of gallons of water and cutting operational cost

ROSENBERG DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

In 1995 Rosenberg voters approved the creation of the Rosenberg Development Corporation (RDC), dedicating 1/2 cent of sales tax per dollar spent within the City to fund Economic Development and public infrastructure. In Fiscal Year 2025, sales tax generated \$7,358,156 for the RDC.

PROJECTS FUNDED BY RDC SALES TAX FOR FY2025

Infrastructure Projects

- Koeblen Road Extension (FM 2218 to Seabourne Creek): \$2,600,000
- Seabourne Creek Regional Sports Complex entrance (FM 2218): \$630,000
- 4th Street Extension (Mons Ave to Rice St): \$500,000
- Seabourne Creek Regional Detention Basin expansion: \$600,000
- Sidewalk connectivity projects: \$150,000

Citywide Services

- Right-of-way mowing along major thoroughfares: \$235,000
- Fort Bend Transit bus route funding: \$75,000

Primary Job Incentive Agreements

- Texas State Technical College job training facility: \$300,000
- Builders FirstSource job creation & sales tax incentive: \$1,083,854

Funds Reserved for Future Projects

- Avenue H / Highway 90A Revitalization: \$1,000,000
- Brazos Town Center street connection: \$75,000
- Site Readiness Program: \$100,000
